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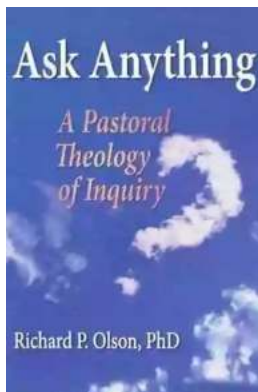


Dr. Susan La Flesche Picotte graduated from medical school in 1889.

Inspired as a child when she saw a patient pass away after not being cared for by their local white physician, Susan was determined to become a physician and help the people on her reservation.

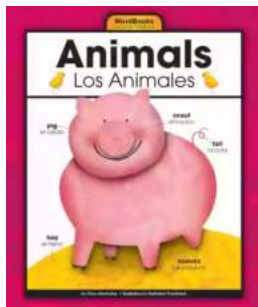
Dr. Susan La Flesche Picotte was the first Native American physician in the United States, and her fight for health and well-being of Native Americans is inspirational.

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
