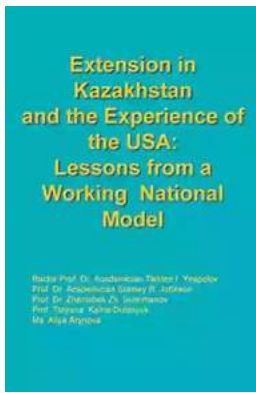
Extension services play a crucial role in promoting agricultural development, rural outreach, and technology transfer in many countries around the world.

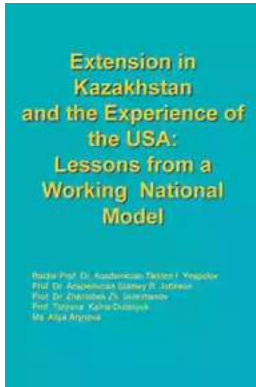
