- Одиннадцать Pronounced as "a-deen-na-tsyat", meaning "eleven".
- Двенадцать Pronounced as "dvy-na-tsyat", meaning "twelve".
- Тринадцать Pronounced as "tree-na-tsyat", meaning "thirteen".
- Четырнадцать Pronounced as "chee-ty-rna-tsyat", meaning "fourteen".
- Пятнадцать Pronounced as "pyat-na-tsyat"", meaning "fifteen".
- Шестнадцать Pronounced as "shest-na-tsyat", meaning "sixteen".
- Семнадцать Pronounced as "syem-na-tsyat", meaning "seventeen".
- Восемнадцать Pronounced as "voh-syem-na-tsyat", meaning "eighteen".
- Девятнадцать Pronounced as "dye- vyat-na-tsyat", meaning "nineteen".
- Двадцать Pronounced as "dva-d-ts aht", meaning "twenty".

Counting Beyond Twenty

Once you've mastered counting up to twenty, the pattern becomes more repetitive, making it easier to grasp. The tens are formed simply by adding "-дцать" ("-tsat"") to the base number. For example:

- Тридцать (tree-d-ts aht') thirty
- Сорок (so-rok) forty
- Пятьдесят (pyat'-dee-syat') fifty
- Шестьдесят (shest'-dee-syat') sixty
- Семьдесят (syem'-dee-syat') seventy
- Восемьдесят (voh-syem'-dee-syat') eighty
- Девяносто (dye-vya-nos-to) ninety

For numbers from 21 to 99, you simply combine the tens with the units. For instance:

- Двадцать один (dva-d-ts aht' a-deen) twenty-one
- Тридцать два (tree-d-ts aht' dva) thirty-two
- Сорок пять (so-rok pyat') forty-five
- Шестьдесят шесть (shest'-dee-syat' shest') sixty-six
- Семьдесят восемь (syem'-dee-syat' voh-syem') seventy-eight
- Девяносто девять (dye-vya-nos-to dye-vyat') ninety-nine

Counting Beyond One Hundred

Now that you've learned how to count up to ninety-nine, let's move on to larger numbers. The pattern for forming numbers above one hundred is similar to that of

English. The hundreds are formed by adding the base number with the word "hundred". Here are some examples:

- Сто (stoh) one hundred
- Двести (dve-stee) two hundred
- Триста (tree-sta) three hundred
- Четыреста (chee-ty-re-sta) four hundred
- Пятьсот (pyat'-sot) five hundred
- Шестьсот (shest'-sot) six hundred
- Семьсот (syem'-sot) seven hundred
- Восемьсот (voh-syem'-sot) eight hundred
- Девятьсот (dye-vyat'-sot) nine hundred

Combining the hundreds with the tens and units, you can count all the way up to one million! Here's an example of counting to 1,000:

- Сто один (stoh a-deen) one hundred and one
- Двести двадцать (dve-stee dva-d-ts aht') two hundred and twenty
- Триста сорок пять (tree-sta so-rok pyat') three hundred and forty-five
- Пятьсот шестьдесят (pyat'-sot shest'-dee-syat') five hundred and sixty
- Семьсот восемьдесят девять (syem'-sot voh-syem'-dee-syat' dye-vyat') seven hundred and eighty-nine
- Тысяча (tys-ya-cha) one thousand


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
