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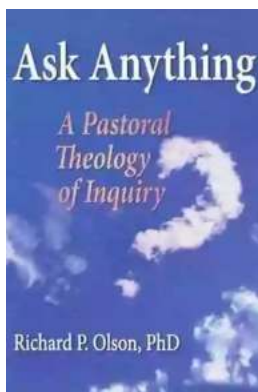

policy in the 19th and 20th century excluded this community from their traditional role in handling forest fires.

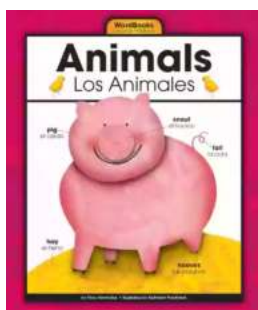

This book examines the factors leading to wild fires, techniques like prescribed burns as well as the efforts by the Native American community to re-engage in land management



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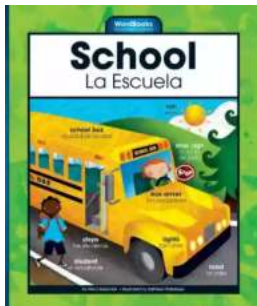
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
