



He thought he was never in with a chance of becoming a mayor last year.



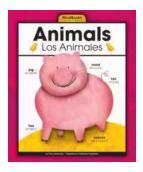
