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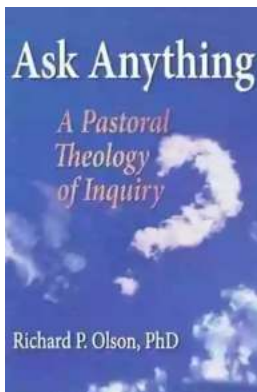

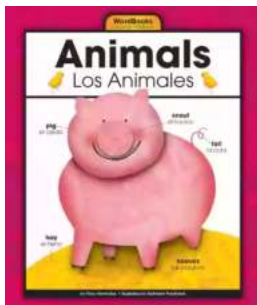
This picture book depicts the history of Indigenous Peoples in the United States
