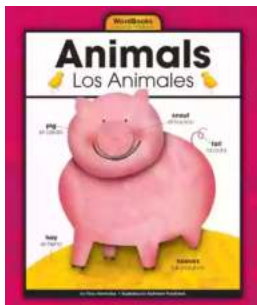
Throughout time, humans have been terrified and fascinated by the diseases history and circumstance have dropped on them. Some of their responses to
