


From the book's Preface:

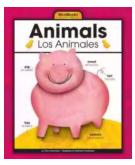
